Highlights from JUMC Administrative Council Meeting, July 26, 2015

- Trustees projects reported: built pantry/storage area beside church kitchen, installing new flooring in Good News Fellowship Hall, replaced music room copier for \$960 annual savings, and addressing security needs in main church building.
- Welcomed new member and Memorials Committee Chair, Barbara Smith.
- Approved continuing support of Katy Lawrence as a Deacon candidate.
- Approved continuing sale of engraved patio bricks at \$150 each to support growing children's ministry space, furnishings, supplies, and related needs, to cost about \$8,000.
- Parsonage Committee proceeding with replacement of parsonage windows.
- Reconsidered previous action to study need for Associate Pastor and substituted a new action to form a study group to address the mission and vision of JUMC.
- Heard about our growing children's ministry and the fall plans (currently over 46 children and a bursting nursery), and its demand on space and personnel resources.
- Heard about the successful youth mission trip to Edisto Island, the successful Jonesborough Days parking project (\$2,629 raised), and the many upcoming plans and projects.
- Parish Nurse reported a successful Relay for Life, blood drive coming up on September 9, a healthy cooking program, emergency preparedness program on September 16, and an October program on Medicare.
- Pastor Lane told of several new families joining the church soon and having children baptized, and reported church directories were received with many errors not made by JUMC and returned for corrections.

August Mission Emphasis

The mission for August is the Jonesborough Area Ministerial Association, better known as JAMA. The mission of JAMA is to feed the hungry by securing food and grocery products and distributing them to the needy, ill, children and the elderly in the Jonesborough area. Elmer Gilespie is the head of JAMA and has been a volunteer since 2002.

The food pantry is open each Thursday and JUMC volunteers Barbara and Roy Ollis and Charlene and David Cleveland staff the pantry the first Thursday of each month. The pantry serves 25-45 each week.

Multiple area churches, as well as the Senior Citizens and The Contra Dance Group, participate in JAMA. Please designate JAMA on your mission offering envelope. You may also help by bringing the item of the month listed in the bulletin and in The Pathfinder.
